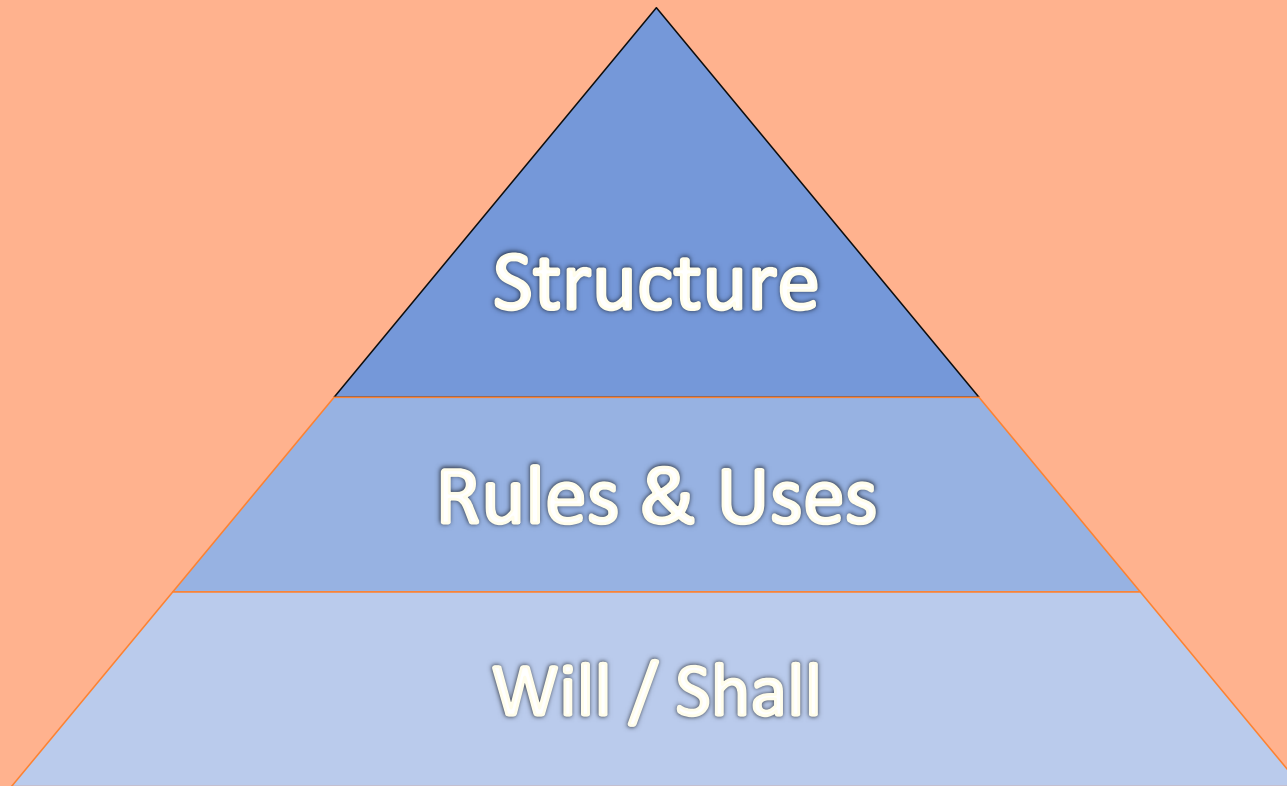


# FUTURE SIMPLE



# STRUCTURE (will)

+	-	?
S + will + V1 + Obj.	S + will not + V1 + Obj.	will + S + V1 + Obj.
She <b>will call</b> me tomorrow.	She <b>won't call</b> me tomorrow.	<b>Will</b> she <b>call</b> me tomorrow?
They <b>will arrive</b> tonight.	They <b>won't arrive</b> tonight.	<b>Will</b> they <b>arrive</b> tonight?

## RULES & USES

As a general rule, use '**will**' for affirmative and negative sentences about the future.

You can use '**will**' for requests as well.

If you want to make an offer or suggestion with I/we, use '**shall**' in the question form.

For very formal statements, especially to describe obligations, use '**shall**'.

# WILL

1. Use Future Simple (will) for future events in questions, affirmative and negative sentences:

- I **will watch** a movie at the weekend.
- She **will let** you know tomorrow.
- My brother **will not participate** in the competition next year.
- **Will they arrive** soon?

# SHALL

1. Use Future Simple (shall) for suggestions and obligations concerning future.
  - Shall we watch a movie at the weekend?
  - She shall let you know tomorrow.
  - My brother shall not participate in the competition next year.
  - Shall I leave soon?
