When we are talking about past we can use
3rd conditionals:

Different Results

Possibilities

When we consider different results ...

If I **had been** hungry, I **would have eaten** something.



You **weren't** hungry.



Different Results

When we consider different
results ...

If I'd **known** you were in
hospital, I **would have**
gone to visit you.



You **didn't** know, so you
didn't go to visit you.



Possibilities

2nd type conditional



- Not real.
- About the **present**.
- We use **past simple**.

3rd type conditional



- Not real.
- About the **past**.
- We use **past perfect**.

VS.

How are they different?

I'm **not** hungry. If I **was** hungry, I **would eat** something.



Now

I **wasn't** hungry. If I **had been** hungry, I **would have eaten** something.



Past

Note that
in 3rd type conditionals we use
past perfect+would have.

E.g. If I had left home earlier,

**I wouldn't have been
late to work.**
