# PRESENT PERFECT & PRESENT PERFECT CONT.

The main difference between Pre. Perf. And Pre. Perf Cont. is the emphasis on duration of the action.

Present Perfect

Present Perf. Cont.

### PRESENT PERFECT

We use present perfect to talk about past actions and experiences.

We use present perfect when the time of the action is not mentioned or not important.

Time not mentioned

I have seen that movie.

She has had an accident.

They have arrived.



## JUST/ALREADY/YET

We usually use just/already/yet with present perfect tense.

Just
\*recently
completed

Already
\*finished
sooner than
expected

Yet
\*not completed
or expected to
happen soon

I have just arrived.

I have already eaten.

Have you finished your homework yet?

I haven't seen her yet.

## NEVER/EVER/BEFORE

We usually use never/ever/before with present perfect tense to express past experiences.

Never
\*I have never
been abroad

Ever
\*Have you
ever eaten
sushi?

Before
\* I haven't seen
you before.

### HAVE GONE &HAVE BEEN TO

have gone \*still away

have been
\* already returned

Where is Jane?

She has gone to Rome.



I've been there before.



### PRESENT PERF. CONT.

We use Present Perf. Cont. to talk about actions started in the past and not competed or just completed. In Pre. Perf. Cont. the emphasis is on the duration of the action

**Emphasis** on duration

I have been studying for 2 hours.

She has been waiting since 10.00.

I have been working all week.

S+ have/has + been+ Ving

## FOR / SINCE

We use for and since to talk about the duration of an action.

For + period of time

I have been living there for two years.

She has been sleeping for 10 hours.

I have been studying since the morning.

Since + Starting time
