

# CONDITIONALS (1ST-2ND)

When we are talking about events and their possible results, we use **if**. The structure we use depends on the reality of the event.

**Real events**

**(1st type)**


**Unreal events**

**(2nd type)**

When it is possible that they will take the bus, she says:


Shall we take the bus or the train?

If we **take** the bus, it will be cheaper.



**Real events**

**(1st type)**



I think I left my watch at your house. **If you find** it, can you call me?

Sure. I definitely will.

'If you find it,' is the **if clause**  
and  
'can you call me?' is the **main clause**.

Note that  
If clauses don't make sense  
on their own,  
But main clauses make sense.

**E.g. I will change my seat...**

**[if nobody shows up]...**

Note that  
in 1st type conditionals  
**if clause** must be **present simple**,  
and the **main clause** will.

**E.g. If they arrive early,  
I will call you.**

**Or a modal:**

**E.g. If they arrive early,  
I might call you.**

We use the 2nd type to dream  
about things...

If I were an astronaut in  
space, I'd never come  
back.



If I were rich, I would buy  
an island.




**Unreal events**  
**(2nd type)**

Or to give advice...

If I were you, I wouldn't eat that.



Woof!



Note that  
in 2nd type conditionals  
**if clause** must be **past simple**,  
and the **main clause** would.

**E.g. If she found my wallet,  
She would let me know.**

Also, the meaning is not 'past'  
even though  
we use past simple.

It's also possible to use could or might in the main clause.



If I won a lot of money, I might buy a house.



We could go out if it stopped raining.
