## 3RD CONDITIONAL

When we are talking about past we can use 3rd conditionals:

**Different Results** 

**Possibilities** 

When we consider different results ...

If I had been hungry, I would have eaten something.

You weren't hungry.





**Different Results** 

When we consider different results ...

If I'd known you were in hospital, I would have gone to visit you.

You didn't know, so you didn't go to visit you.

**2nd** type conditional

**3rd** type conditional

VS.

- Not real.
- About the **present**.
- We use past simple.

- Not real.
- About the **past**.
- We use past <u>perfect</u>.

## How are they different?

I'm not hungry. If I was hungry, I would eat something.

I wasn't hungry. If I had been hungry, I would have eaten something.





Now

**Past** 

Note that in 3rd type conditionals we use

past perfect+would have.

E.g. If I had left home earlier,

I wouldn't have been late to work.

Exercises

9. That was tiring. If they (break) the vase, we (be) in trouble.
10. If the emperor of Constantinople (see) the Ottoman ships coming from the hills, he (prevent) the conquest.

## **Answer Key**

- 1. Be careful with that vase. If you **dropped** (drop) it, it would break into small pieces.
- 2. If I see Sarah, I will tell (tell) her to call you
- 3. I don't think he'll fail the exam. I'd be very surprised if he **failed** (fail).
- 4. If you go (go) right at the end of this street, you'll see a bank on your left.
- 5. I don't think Gary and Emma will get married. I'd be(be) amazed if they did.
- 6. I'd call (call) them now if I were you.
- 7. If he were (be) the manager, he would never do such things.
- 8. I don't know what I **would do** (do) if I lost my passport.
- 9. If I had to take this test, I would prepare (prepare) for it in advance.
- 10. I don't expect to lose my job but if that **happened** (happen), I'd have to find another one.
